save us lots of money, but likewise establish clearer and more consistent rules in use for preserving our archives.

Our work and our commitment is only made possible thanks to your unwavering support, your reliable donations and the collaboration we enjoy with all our partners, both new and old. Women appeal to the Foundation to breathe some hope into their lives and we answer their call by accompanying them in their plans for school and for their future. The Foundation is accordingly a vehicle for RENEWAL for them and for their families. Awesome, n'est-ce pas? And it's all thanks to you.

A wandering Foundation

Since November 1993, the year the Foundation was created, we've covered lots of ground, from Outremont to South Central Montreal, by way of Old Montreal.

A Foundation, even one as modest as ours, inevitably accumulates, over the years, documents, dossiers, photos, exhibition panels, etc. That's without counting the numerous books about Lea Roback, Madeleine Parent and Hélène Pedneault or the works created by the latter, as well as numerous works of art donated to the Foundation over the years.

Let's recall that the Foundation granted only one scholarship in 1994; our suitcase was quite light back then. That's explains why, and of course thanks to the generosity of Hélène Paré, the Foundation's archives were stored at her home until 2010.

As of July 1, 2010, as mentioned in the 2010-2011 report on our activities, we decided to lease "a storage room at the Maison Parent-Roback in which we were able to assemble all the things that belonged to the Foundation..." A solution that was considered attractive at the time, given that the archives were taking up more and more space and the Maison Parent-Roback brought together, under one roof, several women's organizations. Major renovations to the building ended up taking away the room we needed and the Foundation had to leave this magnificent Old-Montreal heritage building.

Ghislaine-Patry Buisson, then Vice-President of the Foundation, found an adequate



space for us on De Lorimier Street. The building, once a factory, was less prestigious than the former premises, but was very well located. We took possession of these new offices in 2015.

In 2020, the De Lorimier building changed ownership twice. And, the current owner substantially increased our rent to which one must add the cost of insurance.

The decision was thus made to terminate our lease and we now have the good fortune to be able to store our archives free-ofcharge in the *Fondaction* building, a stone's throw away from the former premises. We thus moved last March 30, 2021. In addition, we're saving money in terms of insurance and the travel expenses of our administrative secretary.


Each time that we've moved, we've sorted through what we've accumulated by following the rules in use for preserving archives and we've accordingly reduced our needs in terms of storage space. It's likewise obvious that we're working increasingly with digital documents. All this enables us to limit our operating costs. Let's give just one example: the scholarship application exercise. This year, for the first time since the Foundation's creation, we've received no scholarship applications by mail. Indeed, out of the 96 submissions received, 82 candidates used the online form and 14 of them sent it to us via e-mail. This fall, we'll start thinking about digitizing our archives.

A big thank you to *Fondaction* for finding room for us on their premises, which has led us to deem them a Major Partner of the Foundation.

Please take note of our new mailing address, which is important for sending cheques to us, seeing as it's still impossible for the Foundation to receive Interac money transfers.

The LRF will be granting the Bernard Nomand Award

We're proud to announce that the Lea Roback Foundation has been retained by the *Institut de coopération pour l'éducation des adultes* (ICEA), to grant a Bernard Normand Award in the course of our annual exercise of granting scholarships.



Named in honour of the former Executive Director of ICEA, the Bernard Normand Award, five of which are granted every year, honours adults who persevere and go back to school. The 2021 edition draws attention to adults who are educating themselves in school settings, in other words, in institutions that are part of the public education system, such as adult general training centres, career training establishments, CEGEPs and universities, as well as organizations and networks in this sector.

The ICEA is thus joining forces with the initiatives undertaken by the Lea Roback Foundation to support economically disadvantaged and socially involved women, in the pursuit of their studies. It has thereby recognized the value and importance of the work that the LRF has been doing over the years and constitutes an important attestation and boost for the standing and reach of our foundation in the education milieu.

The Bernard Normand Award that the LRF will be granting will thus reward a woman, who thanks to her courage and determination, overcomes significant obstacles and who resumes her education, thereby becoming a source of inspiration for other adults. The value of said scholarship is \$800.

An exceptional partner for the Foundation

The Lea Roback Foundation has recently entered into a collaboration agreement with the Boscoville Foundation that was created nearly 15 years ago by M^e Pierre-Laurier Baribeau.

The Board of Directors of the Boscoville Foundation, whose mission is the social, cultural and educational development of young people up to 24 years old, was seeking to resume its activities. Ms. Nicole Ranger, a friend of our own Foundation, who is a member of the Boscoville Foundation played an instrumental role in bringing the two organizations together and in having a protocol signed between us, that will link us over the next few years. We want to take this opportunity to sincerely thank her.



Under the terms of this agreement, the Boscoville Foundation will give us \$15,000 a year, over the next seven years, which amounts will be distributed as scholarships. The scholarships will be granted to young girls or women under 24 years old, who are pursuing their education in literacy training, high school, career and technical training, or at the CEGEP level. There will likewise be a scholarship attributed to collegial or university level studies in disciplines that focus upon interventions with special needs young people. All the scholarships will bear the name "Pierre-Laurier Baribeau Scholarship".

This exceptional partnership will enable our two organizations to work together to promote education as a means for the selfrealization and empowerment of women.

Women, the financial bedrock of the Foundation

The very overwhelming majority of donations that the Foundation receives come from women.

And the 2020 campaign was no exception to this tendency. Of the \$13,000 that was collected from our Partners and Major Partners, \$7,500 was given to us by women. They're also the majority of our donors who give less than \$500. Small donations of \$20, \$50, \$100 and more added up to \$12,490, in 2020.

In all, this past year's fundraising campaign raised \$25,490. The contributions from our Partners and Major Partners were however less than what we received last year, nearly \$10,000 less, in fact. The 2020 total came to \$13,000 compared to \$22,850, in 2019. Over the years, the Foundation has observed that donations coming from organizations that have supported us for a long time are diminishing. It will be necessary for us to rebuild this channel and invite them to support us once again.

Notwithstanding the foregoing observation, as a result of the 2020 campaign, we're

happy to announce the return of Bâtirente and the Maison générale des Ursulines as Partners of the Foundation. Even though their donation arrived after the end of the fundraising campaign and will thus be recorded in our books for 2021, it's important to draw attention to the \$1,000 contribution we received from the Health and Social Services Professional and Technical Personnel Alliance (APTS), who became a Major Partner this past winter.

This practical and valuable support will enable the Lea Roback Foundation to continue granting scholarships to deserving women to continue their studies. During this pandemic, the number of applications has not decreased. Indeed, in April, we received nearly 100 scholarship requests. Your donations will thus be put to very good use.
